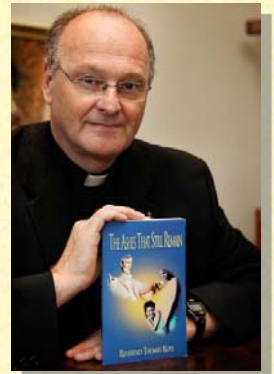

Fr Thomas Koys, M.A.,S.T.L. is author of *The Ashes That Still Remain*, a book that studies the similarities between the US Supreme Court’s *Dred Scott* and *Roe vs Wade* decisions and Lincoln’s conversion. He hosts *The Winds of Change*, radio show each Wednesday at noon, on AM750, WNDZ where he’s been given the nickname, “The mind wrinkle.”



Fr Koys pastored in the Hispanic community for 20 years before being assigned to St James at Sag Bridge. Regrettably, his efforts to reform the parochial Catholic school in his charge, prior to St James, led to his early resignation of his pastorate. As one of the parishioners complained, “We’ve told you that we find your sermons offensive, yet you still keep saying these things”.

Admittedly, Fr Koys’ love for history has opened his eyes to troubling aspects of today’s church in America. He is a strong advocate of our need to rediscover our national “moral compass”, which he believes is broken. Catholics play a vital role in saving America from its self-destruction.
